The LGBT Committee is considering involvement in a UUA program, *Living the Welcoming Congregation: Resources for Continuing the Welcoming Congregation Journey*. Would you like to join this committee project?

Living the Welcoming Congregation, sometimes known as “Welcoming Congregation 2” or “200-level Welcoming Congregation” is a curriculum that was developed by the Unitarian Universalist Association in 2004 as one possible next step that congregations can take after becoming recognized as a Welcoming Congregation, as MVUUF has been recognized.

Many congregations utilize this series of workshops as part of a Welcoming Congregation refresher program. It is recommended that congregations and participants using Living the Welcoming Congregation already have a basic understanding of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer identities and issues and that they have already made a commitment to being a welcoming space for individuals of all sexual orientations and gender identities.

For more information and guidance on continuing our Welcoming Congregation commitment, we can explore Ways to Deepen Your Congregation's Welcome and the refresher program guidance.

Being Environmental

With the warming weather, there are several ways to keep our houses cooler. One is by the use of shades, blinds or some kind of window cover on the south and west sides of the house. There are many options available in sizes, types and colors. Plantings also can offer shade in the forms of shrubs, small trees and vines. Check the fully mature size before you make your purchasing decision. Also consider adjusting your thermostat to a less cool temperature. See what you're willing to tolerate. Try to limit more vigorous activity to earlier morning or later evening hours. If you're considering using a rain barrel, it can be used for non-food type plants. Then flowers, shrubs, trees can receive the benefit of using the water caught by rain barrels instead of just letting it go into the ground from downspouts that drain the water away. Rain barrels come in all sizes and price ranges. Check how to access the water once it's collected, as some types may work better for your individual situation than other types.

Open Minds

June 15, 6:30 p.m. Discussion on Informal Economy

Open Minds discussion on Wednesday, June 15 will center on a key human rights issue identified by the UUSC, the informal economy. Informal Economy is explained on the [UUSC website](#):

Every contemporary economy consists of three “layers.” The most visible is the “formal” sector — in which people are employed in jobs that are measured as part of the labor force, and businesses are subject to some sort of regulation, taxation, and governmental oversight. The most obscure or invisible layer is the “underground” economy, which consists of illegal activities such as the drug trade, prostitution (where it is illegal), human trafficking, and money laundering. The informal economy is the layer in which workers and entrepreneurial enterprises base their exchange in cash or barter; avoid regulation, taxation, and worker protections; and exist “as-needed” as self-employed other persons who provide commodities and labor without creating permanent institutions that would become part of the formal economy.

Though small in proportion to our total economy, the informal economy of the United States is the largest informal economy in the world. Examples of informal sector workers in the United States include day laborers; children, siblings, or spouses who provide critical labor at family-owned businesses but may not be paid, receive benefits, or contribute to Social Security; some domestic workers; “under the table” workers; and street musicians.

Donna Beaumont will facilitate a discussion of issues related to the informal economy such as unemployment as a driver of the informal economy, worker exploitation, women in the informal economy, lack of benefits and worker protections, efforts to organize.

The Social Justice Interest Group hosts the Open Minds discussion series on the third Wednesday of each month **at 6:30 p.m.** at the fellowship building, to encourage exploration and discussion of social justice and related issues. The series is open to the public.
