MVUUF To Welcome Special Guests in April

Dr. M. Burroughs on April 1st & Rabbi Joshua Taub April 29th

Reducator, poet, and institution-builder Dr. Margaret Burroughs will wrap up a week-long visit to the Mt. Vernon area as the guest of honor at a reception held at 11:15 a.m. on Sunday, April 1, 2007 at our fellowship.

Paul Oakley will lead the 10:00 service on this morning with a special message for Passover. Dr. Burroughs will also speak briefly at the morning service, prior to her reception. During the reception, Dr. Burroughs will share some of her work, and will be available to answer questions about her life and work.

Dr. Burroughs made the first of her many contributions to African American arts and culture when she founded – at age twenty-two – the South Side Community Arts Center in Chicago, a community organization that serves as a gallery and workshop studio for artists and students. Dr. Burroughs continues to serve on the board of the Center, which remains active more than sixty years after its formation.

Dr. Burroughs and her husband Charles Burroughs made their best-known contribution to African American posterity in 1961 when they founded the DuSable Museum of African American History on the ground floor of their Chicago home. The museum, which has since moved to its own buildings in Chicago's Washington Park, has become an internationally recognized resource for African American art.

Although Dr. Burroughs has worked in sculpture, painting and many other art forms throughout

her career, it is her exceptional skill as a printmaker that has earned her a place within the history of art. For many years, she has worked with linoleum block prints to create images evocative of African American culture. Dr. Burroughs' work has been featured in exclusive shows at the Corcoran Art Galleries in Washington, D.C., and at the Studio Museum in New York. She has served as art director for the Negro Hall of Fame and has illustrated many books, including What Shall I Tell My Children Who are Black?.

Dr. Burroughs has also published several volumes of her own poems, illustrated a number of children's books, and exhibited her own artwork all over the world. In 1975 she received the President's Humanitarian Award and in 1977 was named one of Chicago's Most Influential Women by the Chicago Defender.



Rabbi Joshua Taub to Speak At April 29th Service

abbi Joshua Taub is the senior rabbi at Temple Emanuel in Creve Coeur (St. Louis). Temple Emanuel is a synagogue of the Reform denomination of Judaism. Rabbi Taub has graciously accepted our invitation to speak at our April 29th Service.

Reform Judaism is now the largest Jewish movement in North America, with more than 900 congregations and 1.5 million people. Reform Judaism affirms the central tenets of Judaism - God, Torah and Israel - even as it acknowledges the diversity of Reform Jewish beliefs and practices. Reform Jews believe that all human beings are created in the image of God, and that they are God's partners in improving the world. *Tikkun olam* — repairing the world — is a hallmark of Reform Judaism, striving to bring peace, freedom, and justice to all people.

Reform Jews are committed to the principle of inclusion, not exclusion. Since 1978 the Reform Movement has been reaching out to Jews-by-choice and interfaith families, encouraging them to embrace Judaism. Reform Jews are committed to the absolute equality of women in all areas of Jewish life. They were the first movement to ordain women rabbis, invest women cantors, and elect women presidents of their synagogues. Reform Jews are also committed to the full participation of gays and lesbians in synagogue life as well as society at large.

Temple Emanuel has 375 member families. 40-50% of members are married to non-Jews. Temple Emanuel has a support group for interfaith families, and Rabbi Taub supports these families with, among other things, lectures on intermarriage and the inclusion of the non-Jewish family members within the Temple Emanuel community. Rabbi Taub is involved in cooperative study, lecture, and social justice activities with congregations of other Jewish denominations.

Temple Emanuel is also actively involved in interfaith activities. Rabbi Taub with other

members of Rabbis for Human Rights North America has been a signatory of several joint letters protesting or arguing for social justice, opposing torture, etc.

Please join us on this special morning to hear Rabbi Taub speak at our congregation!
