The Social Justice Interest Group hosts the Open Minds discussion series as a monthly meeting on the third Wednesday **at 7 p.m.** at the fellowship building, to encourage exploration and discussion of social justice and related issues. The series is open to the public.


On **October 15**, the discussion will center on the **Minimum Wage**, led by Debbie White and Paul Oakley. On **November 19**, Gail DeVilbiss will lead a discussion on **Food Ethics**, and we'll have an Ethical Eating potluck after the November 23 service.

In order for this series to succeed, we need your interest, help, and participation. Topics can include areas of economic justice, environmental justice, human rights, and civil liberties; anything in accordance with our seven principles. In accordance with the fellowship policy on political activity at the fellowship, programs shall be nonpartisan. We are interested in supporting informed participation in the democratic process.

Examples of specific topics that could be presented include Green Sanctuary, ethical eating, compassionate consumption, LGBTQ issues, immigration justice, human right to water. Topics related to this year's UUSC focus area of "Plant Seeds, Harvest Justice" (food sovereignty) include genetically modified seeds, sustainable gardening methods, cooperatives and farmers' markets, use of fossil fuels in the food chain.

Advancing human rights is the work of many joining hands

The UUSC Link

The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee is an independent human rights organization, supported through the volunteer efforts and financial gifts of its members and supporters, and linked to UU congregations through local representatives. The four focus areas of its work include: Rights in Humanitarian Crises; Civil Liberties; Economic Justice; and Environmental Justice.

UUSC offers this update on the Detroit water shutoffs: In the face of water shutoffs, UUSC joined with the Michigan Welfare Rights Organization, the Unitarian Universalist Association, the Michigan UU Social Justice Network, and other partners to coordinate a series of actions, including:

- A <u>petition</u>, <u>signed by more than 6,000 UUSC supporters</u>, calling on select Detroit officials to stop the shutoffs
- •Several legal suits in support of affected residents
- •Assistance to a U.N. investigation of the situation
- Media outreach to raise awareness

The collective efforts of all the community members, activists, and collaborating pro bono attorneys succeeded in getting a temporary moratorium on the shutoffs and control of the water utility returned to the democratically elected mayor from the city's emergency manager. However the moratorium ended on August 26, and shutoffs have resumed.

A few weeks ago, Detroit Mayor Duggan announced a "10-point plan" to deal with the shutoff crisis. UUSC convened a group of expert researchers who will evaluate what is happening in three cities to see if there are formal patterns of discrimination in water provision and determine the impact on families with children. The findings of this research will be used to guide UUSC's national policy advocacy work going forward.

Here at MVUUF, we will kick off Guest at Your Table on November 23. The Social Justice Interest Group will host an ethical eating potluck after the service. More detail later – mark your calendar now for good food and good fellowship.


